CURRENT FOCUS

My current focuses are liaising with partner agencies to escalate the care of our vulnerable members of the community with the right agencies that suit their needs, such as dementia, housing issues or service.

I'm also working to reduce Anti-Social Behaviour in the community by promptly and accurately working with partners and colleagues to issue proportionate interventions on those that harm the community. your local neighbourhood officers. On that note...

What is the news from the area?

Over the month of March as well as our daily business, we held a week of action targeting drug offences and those looking to exploit those vulnerable to taking drugs. The week which ran from 4th to the 10th March involved a variety of activities including,

- Vulnerable address checks. This is where we visit those known to us for being previous victims of cuckooing (a practice where people take over a person's home and use the property to facilitate exploitation) and ensure that they have the necessary support in place.

- Engaged with members of public in the town centre with staff from SDAS (Somerset Drug and Alcohol Service)

- On 6th March a warrant was carried out at a property in Taunton. Substances suspected to be Class A drugs and cash were found at the property, along with two weapons. Three arrests were made and those people have since been released under investigation.

Our Response Officers had a good result on the 16th March following a victim spotting a crime in progress and calling it in! In the late hours of the night, a male was seen in the back of a works van suspected of stealing tools. The victim confronted the suspect causing the suspect to flee. Thankfully the victim contacted us immediately and we stopped and arrested the male. Male has been charged and bailed where they will appear in court soon. Great work by the victim!

LOCAL PRIORITIES CONCERN FOR WELFARE

One of our priorities currently is dealing with an individual who continues to frequent specific locations, causing members of the public to become concerned for the individuals welfare.

This unfortunately is a daily occurrence, taking up many hours of our time. We are working with the NHS and other services to try and prevent this from happening, as the behaviour causes disruption for the public.

These issues are often complex and there is no easy answer to solving the problem, but one that we are in the middle of currently dealing with.

POLICE EARLY INTERVENTION TEAM



The Police Early Intervention Team works with 11 - 17 year olds who are at risk of serious violence or exploitation.

They work closely with other agencies to support the work of the Violence Reduction Partnership which takes a Public Health Approach to reducing violence.

As part of a wider piece of work looking at violence and young people, over 900 young people in Taunton completed a survey about their concerns and experiences. Young people said they thought supervised spaces and access to trusted adults for advice and support would help to reduce violence.

Using funds secured from OP Grip and working in partnership with McDonalds and Young Somerset a Youth Hub has been set up in McDonalds, East Street, Taunton.

This is open every Saturday from 3pm until 5pm so that young people, their families or guardians can access advice and support.

The hub started in February and over 90 young people have already engaged with the service. Please drop in if you would like to talk to somebody.

MORE NEWS FROM THE AREA

On Sunday 17th March, we received a report from the town centre CCTV operators, of a male who they were monitoring who was suspected of stealing a large amount of items from multiple businesses. Within minutes of the report Police attended and located the male where he was arrested. The male was put before the courts the next day where they received a 10-week custodial sentence.

On Monday 18th March, we again were alerted by town centre CCTV operators of a male who had stolen items from businesses in the town. Within minutes of the report all goods were recovered from the suspect and they will be dealt with at a later time.

Then on Wednesday 20th March, in a similar fashion as the above, we located a male suspect within minutes of being notified by CCTV operators. Male was arrested, all goods were recovered and male is in court as of this morning.

And lastly three teenagers have been given custodial sentences after a man was stabbed in Halcon in Taunton in February 2023. Hamza Mahmoud, 19, and Faisal Uriakhail and Zaeden Perkins, both 18, were sentenced at Bristol Crown Court on Friday 15th March for what the judge described as a "frenzied and sustained" attack. Officer in the case DC Natalie Norman said:

"The attack happened in a residential area and must have been shocking for families living nearby. I hope the custodial sentences for these young adults will reassure the community how seriously the criminal justice system takes knife crime."

Roads Policing

On Sunday 10th March, Roads Policing Officers were alerted to this vehicle by their ANPR system. The automatic system which reads number plates alerted the officer due to the following: Vehicle had no tax for **3 years**, no MOT for **2 years** and no insurance for **8 months**! Vehicle seized and driver being dealt with!





On Monday 25th March, Roads Policing Officers spotted a vehicle driving around the North Taunton area without insurance, but unfortunately the vehicle was lost to sight. Less than **24 hours** later and the local PCSOs located the vehicle on a driveway. The vehicle was then seized. One less uninsured vehicle on the road.

COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH

For those that don't know what 'Community Speedwatch' is, it is where volunteers from the local community carry out speed monitoring checks on specific roads across the community.

The aim of Community SpeedWatch is to make motorists who speed through residential neighbourhoods aware of the impact their actions have on local residents, or the danger they pose to other road users and pedestrians. This is something we are working with communities to address.

How SpeedWatch works

A Community SpeedWatch can be set up in any village, small town, or urban area, governed by either a 20, 30 or 40 miles per hour speed limit.

A team of local residents who are willing to volunteer a small amount of time each week are trained and issued with speed detection equipment to monitor speeds.

Vehicles observed speeding will be sent a warning letter along with advice to help change their driving behaviour.

Further action will be taken by the police against persistent and high end speed offenders as well as targeting individual locations.

Activity during March

Over the month of March, 7 out of the 16 Community Speedwatch schemes in Taunton have been visibly active across the different communities. From the 16 sessions that have taken place, **6850** vehicles have been monitored by our Speedwatch volunteers. From those, a total of **72** letters have been sent out to drivers that have not adhered to the speed limit.

The Community Speedwatch is a great service that greatly assists the Constabulary in reducing speed across the communities. Should you wish to join an existing Speedwatch, or would like to set one up for your area, you can find more information here:

On our systems we can see far more detailed information, but for what we are allowed to share with the public, crime types are grouped together.

For example one of the categories above is '<u>Violent Crime</u>'. Domestic incidents fall within that category and Domestic incidents are one of the most common type of incidents we as the Police attend. Hopefully this somewhat reassures you of why the number of crimes within that category are high.
